

The project to restore Pearland's historic train depot has been put on indefinite hold. According to an interview with Deputy City Manager Jon Branson that appeared on the Chronicle's website on June 16, "Because of COVID-19, (the Depot project) has been put on the back shelf. We did work with the consultant to revise the cost estimate, and right now, we are just in a holding pattern until further notice until we determine what is the best course of action."

Branson has acted as the City of Pearland's liaison for the project since the departure of Convention & Visitors Bureau Executive Director, Kim Sinistore, last August. To date, the city has not successfully hired Sinistore's replacement.

The Depot Committee, under guidance from the Pearland Historical Society, chose to refund nearly \$10,000 that had been raised from private donors through the sale of engraved brick pavers. The committee felt that, with no clear path forward, or timeline for completion, that donors' contributions should not be kept indefinitely. The Pearland Historical Society remains able to accept donations for the project, in accordance with a memorandum of understanding with the City of Pearland.

We can be very proud of our accomplishments up to this point on the project: We were able to successfully fund and produce a professional quality documentary about the Depot's history, through the support of Allegiance Bank. We were able to open the depot building to the public for the first time in a decade during the city's 125th Anniversary celebration. And finally, the preservation of the Depot continues to be a talking point among Pearland City Council members. In the future, we hope that fresh eyes and renewed enthusiasm for Pearland's history will once again bring life back to Pearland's birthplace, our Depot.

Dwight Bittick, the man who found Mark Belt

While doing research in October of 2010, Dwight Bittick discovered a reference in the Galveston Daily News dated March 16, 1887 about a man staying at the Tremont Hotel in Galveston, who registered as Mark Belt of Mark Belt, Texas. He found another reference to Mark Belt from the May 24, 1887 issue of the newspaper under new arrivals at the Beach Hotel, and thereby solved one of the great mysteries of Pearland history.

Although it was known that the original name of Pear Land was Mark Belt, questions remained about whether the name referred to a man or to a railroad term. Dwight's discovery in the newspaper's archives determined that Mark Belt was indeed a person and inspired his further investigation.

Dwight's extensive research turned up a trove of information on Marcus Lindsey Belt, who was born in Lebanon, Kentucky on September 16, 1837 and died in Higginsville, Missouri on August 27, 1921 at age 83. During his long life, he worked as a coal miner, soldier, merchant, developer, politician, and railroad man, but it was his time with the Brazoria Land and Cattle Company of Missouri that brought him to Texas and to a section of the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe Railroad between Alvin and Houston, where a siding and switch station was established along with a nearby ranch house. In 1882, this became Mark Belt, Texas on the site that was later platted and rechristened Pear Land in 1894 by Witold Zychlinski.

Witold Zychlinski was the other man of mystery in Pearland history. He filed the plat for record in Angleton on September 26, 1894 and renamed the town Pear Land. Shortly thereafter, he vanished. In January of 2005, I contacted the great-grandson of Pearland's founder in Chicago, Illinois: William F. Willoughby. He sent me a photograph of Witold Zychlinski that I forwarded to Mickey Mark at the Pearland Historical Society along with my story. "Finding Zychlinski," which was published in the April 2005 edition of the Newsletter. No one was more happy or excited for me than Dwight Bittick.

Five years later, Dwight Bittick found Mark Belt in the newspaper archives and wrote a story, "Mark Belt, Texas," which appeared in the January 2011 edition of Pearland Historical Society Newsletter. Using this story and other information collected and cataloged by Dwight, including the fact that Mark

Belt had once been mayor of Higginsville, Missouri. I contacted a woman in Higginsville who graciously sent me a copy of his mayoral portrait, which I forwarded to the Pearland Historical Society. Dwight congratulated me, but nothing would have come to light without his original spadework.


I met Dwight Bittick in 1956, when he was a freshman left fielder for the Pearland Oilers baseball team, and I was in the third grade and served as the team's batboy. It was 40 years until Dwight and I met up again at a historical society reunion. We shared our research and interest in Pearland history, especially after Witold Zychlinski's portrait was placed on a wall in the lobby of Pearland's City Hall in 2006.

In 2011, Dwight sent me an email saying that Mickey Mark had scanned the photograph of Mark Belt and placed it a frame with a note explaining his connection to Pearland, and added that the portrait would be hung in city hall next to Zychlinski. He said when that happened, he would take a picture of both and send it to me. I had asked that he have his picture taken in front of the portraits.

He wrote, "I'll wait for your return trip this fall for our picture. You don't find a historian and an accomplished 'Batboy' just anywhere. Thanks Dwight." You don't find a friend like Dwight just anywhere.

An article in the 2000 Society Newsletter reflects info from one of Josie Frankenberger Heflin's scrapbooks - Property Tax receipts for the years 1901, 1902 and 1903, for Lots 41, 42 and 43, Block 12 of the Pearland Townsite.

The lots were valued at \$100.00 each.

Total tax for the three lots in 1901 was \$3.97; and 1902 and 1903 the tax was reduced to \$3.22. Do you think citizens complained about "high taxes" in those days???

Ah... do you remember these:

-The "tent" skating rink that came to town each summer. Closed Wednesdays and Sundays for everyone to attend Church.

-Dr. Wm. E. Long owned the corner drugstore. He passed away in 1940. B.B. Ainsworth, Superintendent of Schools, owned the drugstore until 1945 when he sold to Luella and Smitty. Luella sold the Pearland Drugstore in 1980 [but not before Bill King drove his Dad's Oldsmobile through the building] Memories!

-Lester and Kathleen Williams owned the only swimming pool in town. However, many kids learned to swim in the "Main Canal" on FM 1128. No need for canals today since there are no longer any rice fields and the Rice Drier was demoed in 2019......

-Square Dances were held in the Rice Drier. Entire families attended - Doors open, big fans blowing - **Vernon "Banjo" Halik** was the "caller." Lots of yummy BBQ!

-Dances were also held in the 'Old Gym' on Grand Boulevard. The building was originally the two-story 1912 High School. The second floor was destroyed in the 1915 storm and the first floor was renovated to the Elementary School – and then converted to a gym. It was demoed in December 1965 for additional classrooms at Pearland Elementary School.

-Passenger trains stopped at the Pearland Depot. W. B. Bretherton was the Station Agent. Loved to watch him tap a message in Morse Code!

- -- Gas flares lit up the Manvel sky!
- -Pearland ISD "Summer Recreation" and Travel Clubs.
- -Berry Miller graciously taking all elementary students to the Shrine Circus.
- -Old Alvin Road intersecting with SH 35.
